# Expanding access to high quality learning materials: Creating storybooks offline with Saide's new African Storybook (ASb) Maker

#### **South African Institute for Distance Education (Saide)**

- Works across sub-Saharan Africa to achieve educational transformation through
- ✓ Collaboration with initiatives that uphold open learning principles including OERs;
- ✓ mediated through technology;
- ✓ ASb is Saide's digital publishing initiative responding to a severe shortage of books for early reading for children in Africa in their own languages.





- In 2014 to2017, ASb was piloted in Kenya,
   South Africa, Lesotho and Uganda; and then
- Extended to Ethiopia, Rwanda, Cameroon, DRC, Nigeria, Ghana, Benin, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Mozambique and Namibia;
- The ASb www.africanstorybook.org launched in 2014: 120 books; 64 languages of Africa;
- Has 1300+ books; 5000+ translations; 190 languages of Africa.



#### Saide

- Through innovation, continues to innovate to expand access, use and contribution;
- At the end of 2019, the African Storybook
   Maker was developed –

#### Now **PILOTING in KENYA**



- ✓ allows people to create picture storybooks
  offline on their mobile phone or tablet, and
- ✓ publish them on the ASb main website when they are connected to the internet.



### Using the ASb Maker to create a story

- Download from Google Play/App Store
- Open app
- Type the title of the storybook
- Name of the writer/s then select it
- Scroll to select the language of the story
- Select the colour of the book cover & picture for the cover


Tap (1) to create a new book.

#### **Pictures**

Writers can illustrate their storybooks with their own pictures by:

- Taking a photograph of a picture (e.g. of a child's drawing) – name of child as illustrator;
- Using a picture or photograph from the cellphone or tablet – name of photographer;
   OR
- Using a picture from the Maker App picture library.




### Creating pages of the storybook

- A page has a place for a picture and up to 50 words of text.
- Type the words, or add a picture or do both in each of the pages of your storybook.
- Save each completed page by tapping S
- Add new pages by tapping +
- Move pages using ‡
- Edit as many times as you want.
- If happy and connected, can Publish
- A line summary needed when publishing.
- Delete

#### **Progress**

- In 2019, story writing workshops with children held in SA to help develop a **guide** to creating storybooks with children, including using the Maker **15 books**;
- A draft ASb Guide to Creating Storybooks with Children using the Maker is ready;
- In 2020, 20 books were developed and published in a workshop in SA using the Maker;
- Seven Librarians from six libraries and 16 teachers from two schools trained in Kenya;
- Goal Encourage use and republishing on other platforms.



#### **ASb Maker provides the following solutions:**

- The connectivity challenges of many users by providing an offline solution to create storybooks for and with children.
- The limited computer skills by making it easy for users to create their own storybooks following simple instructions using phones and tablets.
- It highlights the importance of the four areas of children's literacy: Read, Write, Listen, Speak
- Makes it possible to write in African languages increasing the supply and availability of African language storybooks.



### As piloting continues, issues addressed

- 130 storybooks have been independently created using the Maker – Quality Assuarance;
- Problem with double marks (") and sometimes the use of the apostrophe – been resolved;
- How to signal books created using the Maker, by Children or adults;
- Support for champions to use in Covid-19 era;
- Piloting continues post Covid-19.
